

**Child Support Amounts Under SB 382 and Current Law**  
**Hypothetical Problems for ALAS-GLSP Training**  
**November 30, 2006**

<b>Family A - (median income, young children)</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Two children, ages 2 and 6, live with Mom A</li> <li>• Dad A has 1 child from prior marriage, pays \$200 per month in child support</li> <li>• Mom A earns \$1,138 per month</li> <li>• Dad A earns an average of \$2,860 per month (\$2,400 in regular wages + \$460 in overtime)</li> <li>• Mom A pays child care of \$430 per month (averaged over the year), as follows: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For younger child: \$3,600/year</li> <li>• For older child: \$950/year during school + \$400/year summer + \$210 other breaks</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Dad A pays health insurance for children at \$250 per month</li> </ul>	
Current Law — Probable Range of CS to be paid by Dad A <i>(Amount variable, depending on treatment of prior CS order and insurance premium as deviations)</i>	<b>\$658-801</b>
SB 382 — CS to be paid by Dad A	<b>\$969</b>

<b>Family B - (very low income)</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Two children, ages 2 and 6, live with Mom B</li> <li>• Dad B earns \$893 per month</li> <li>• Mom B is disabled, receives SSI of \$603 per month</li> <li>• No child care or health insurance premium (children on Medicaid)</li> </ul>	
Current Law — Range of CS to be paid by Dad B	<b>\$205-250</b>
SB 382 — CS to be paid by Dad B	<b>\$313</b>

<b>Family C - (low income, young children)</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Two children, ages 2 and 6, live with Dad C</li> <li>• Dad C is self-employed and earns \$1,700 per month</li> <li>• Mom C earns \$1,000 per month in wages</li> <li>• Dad C pays child care, average of \$383 per month, as follows:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For younger child, \$3,450.00 per year</li> <li>• For older child, \$550/yr. during school + \$500/yr. during summer + \$100/yr. other breaks</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Mom C pays child care, average of \$50 per month, as follows:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For younger child, \$400 per year during summer visitation</li> <li>• For older child, \$200 per year during summer visitation</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Mom C pays \$70 per month health insurance premium for children (PeachCare)</li> <li>• Children visit with Mom C every other weekend, ½ of school holidays, 6 weeks in summer</li> </ul>	
Current Law — Range of CS to be paid by Mom C <i>(Amount variable, depending on treatment of visitation, child care and insurance premium as deviations)</i>	<b>\$230-280</b>
SB 382 — CS to be paid by Mom C <i>(Amount variable, depending on Low-Income Deviation of \$273.51 and potential deviation for parenting time.)</i>	<b>\$100-374</b>

<b>Family D - (median income, teenage children)</b>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Same facts as Family A, but children are ages 14 and 16, so no child care expenses</li> <li>• Also, Dad D pays \$50 per month per child for dental &amp; vision insurance</li> <li>• And, Mom D pays \$200 per year per child for band &amp; soccer</li> <li>• And, Dad D has remarried and has a 2-year-old child together with his present wife (living with him)</li> </ul>	
Current Law — Range of CS to be paid by Dad D <i>(Amount variable, depending on treatment of prior CS order, 2-year-old, in home and insurance premiums as deviations.)</i>	<b>\$658-801</b>
SB 382 — CS to be paid by Dad D <i>(Amount variable, depending on discretionary adjustment for 2-year-old, deviations for dental &amp; vision insurance and extracurricular activities.)</i>	<b>\$526-668</b>
